

2022 Stand-Down to Prevent Falls in Construction

Analysis & Recommendations from OSHA's Certificate of Participation Data & CPWR's Online Ordering Form¹


In 2022, 3,409 stand-downs reached 455,175 workers. Commercial construction was the most selected type of construction for both stand-downs held (41%) and workers reached (50%).







Texas (358), California (231), Florida (178), New York (176), and Pennsylvania (170) held the most stand-downs. Texas (61,861), California (30,905), Louisiana (14,705), Florida (14,214), and Pennsylvania (13,018) reached the highest number of workers in their events.

171 stand-downs were held internationally, reaching **118,567** workers abroad.

Stand-Down participation is back up! In 2020, when the pandemic began, participation fell.

Compared to 2019, the final Stand-Down before the pandemic began in 2020, the total number of stand-downs held and workers reached has almost fully recovered as of 2022.

Participant Recommendations for Hosting Successful Stand-Downs

Make it interactive


- Engage workers in active participation to "drive the point home".
- Facilitate discussions, make time for question-andanswer sessions, create breakout groups, prioritize individual conversations, promote interaction between co-workers, and ask for feedback from employees about how to improve safety.


Make it personalized

- Highlight actual fall stories to help the risk of falls feel more real.
- Tailor content to specific jobsites and workers
 present by focusing on specific plans, hazards, and
 strategies for the work at hand.



In 2022, CPWR distributed close to 400,000 FREE hardhat stickers, available to order each year before the Stand-Down at stopconstructionfalls.com.





Fourty-five percent of stand-downs held were for fewer than 20 workers. The most mentioned activities were trainings, meetings/huddles, toolbox talks, videos, and demonstrations. It was common for event organizers to describe combining multiple types of activities during their stand-downs, like hosting a training followed by providing refreshments and hardhat stickers.
